

UNO-R CELEBRATES VOCATION AWARENESS DAY

The university community celebrated the Vocation Awareness Day with the theme, “The Voice that calls within” last November 20, 2020. A talk about vocation was given by Fray Romeo Ben Potencio, OAR before the Vocation Mass at 3pm at the oratory of St. Nicholas of Tolentino. Fr. Potencio opened his reflection by requesting everyone to discern on the spirituality of their own vocation in life and to dialogue with God and the Saints. Reflect on the will of God for us. We need to acknowledge that God is the Principal of our vocation. We have to remember also that God has set for us a unique way that would lead us to our redemption or salvation. Or response is or vocation, our choice of life. We always have to discern the will of God because most often it is off-tangent with ours. There is always sacrifice in following God. We need to ask ourselves, What God is asking of me? How does God want me to serve Him?

Fr. Potencio also shared that there are four vocations that God wants us to choose from. The first is Married life. He called it as the primordial vocation. It is the basic framework of all other vocations. Second is Single Blessedness. This is a life for those who have special missions for the Church. This is a life

dedicated for service to others. Third is Religious life. This is for those who had dedicated their lives to God embracing the Evangelical Counsels of Chastity, Poverty and Obedience. This is a life embracing a certain charisms, like

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that of the Augustinian Recollects which is to build communion. He further noted that we are builders of relationship with God and our brethren in school and on the mission. And the fourth is the Priesthood whose nucleus is the pastoral ministry of saving souls through teaching and preaching.

He recapped his talk by again asking these questions: What God wants from us?; What is our vocation?; and What is my mission? He then continued by sharing his religious vocation experience. He said that his vocation entails sacrifice, personal and family. But the consolation of the sacrifice is that the family becomes part of his vocation. He encouraged everyone to entertain the gift of vocation that God has given us. Never hesitate to answer that call.

UNO-R DONATES TO CSNT-R and Monastery

The university in its passion to help the small OAR schools, as embodied in Life and Mission Project (LAMP)#37 of the OAR Province of St. Ezekiel Moreno, has donated to Colegio San Nicolas de Tolentino - Recoletos, Talisay City (CSNT-R). The donations were turned-over last November 20, 2020 to the staff of CSNT-R. THE SEASON OF ADVENT STARTS ON SUNDAY, Nov. 29.

The liturgical season of Advent marks the time of spiritual preparation by the faithful before Christmas. Advent begins on the Sunday after the Solemnity of Christ the King. It spans four Sundays and four weeks of preparation, although the last week of Advent is usually truncated because of when Christmas falls.

The Catechism stresses the two-fold meaning of this coming : When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Saviors first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for His second coming . Despite the sketchy history behind Advent, the importance of this season remains to focus on the coming of our Lord. (Advent comes from the Latin *adventus*, meaning coming.) The Catechism stresses the two-fold meaning of this coming : When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Saviors first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for His second coming (No. 524).

A good, pious way to help us in our Advent preparation has been the use of the Advent wreath. The wreath is a circle, which has no beginning or end: So we call to mind how our lives, here and now, participate in the eternity of Gods plan of salvation and how we hope to share eternal life in the Kingdom of Heaven. The wreath is made of fresh plant material, because Christ came to give us new life through His passion, death, and resurrection. Three candles are purple, symbolizing penance, preparation, and sacrifice; the pink candle symbolizes the same but highlights the third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, when we rejoice because our preparation is now half-way finished.

The light represents Christ, who entered this world to scatter the darkness of evil and show us the way of righteousness. The progression of lighting candles shows our increasing readiness to meet our Lord. Each family ought to have an Advent wreath, light it at dinner time, and say the special prayers. This tradition will help each family keep its focus on the true meaning of Christmas. In all, during Advent we strive to fulfill the opening prayer for the Mass of the First Sunday of Advent: Father in Heaven, ... increase our longing for Christ our Savior and give us the strength to grow in love, that the dawn of His coming may find us rejoicing in His presence and welcoming the light of His truth.
